4. Mathematical Modeling of Language Retention in Assimil

Step-by-Step Daily Execution Workflow

1. Passive Audition (3-5 minutes): Listen to the lesson audio without looking at the book. This isolates the auditory cortex and prevents visual bias from the written word.
2. Visual Mapping (5 minutes): Read the text along with the audio. Map the sounds to the characters/phonemes.
3. Analytical Breakdown (10 minutes): Study the notes and the translation. Pay close attention to the morphemes and syntax differences between Italian and English.
4. Verbal Mimicry (5 minutes): Read the dialogue aloud. Focus on prosody and intonation rather than just individual words (Shadowing Technique).

7. Troubleshooting Common Failure Modes
