

Birsa Munda: The Technical and Socio-Political Legacy of the Dharati Aba and the Evolution of Tribal Rights in India

The **Ulgulan** of 1899-1900 was a sophisticated guerrilla campaign. Birsa Munda utilized the difficult terrain of the Chotanagpur plateau to neutralize the technological superiority of British firearms. The movement involved precise planning, using secret meetings at **Dumbari Hill** to coordinate strikes across various police stations and administrative centers.

The battle at Dumbari Hill serves as a case study in the limitations of traditional weaponry against industrial-era military technology. This event highlights the technical transition in 19th-century warfare where firepower began to consistently overcome geographical advantages.

4. The Chotanagpur Tenancy (CNT) Act of 1908: A Legal Technicality
