Advanced Cardiac Interventions

When a patient presents with acute chest pain, the first clinical priority according to BKAT standards is **rest**. Rest reduces myocardial oxygen demand (MVO₂), which is essential when the coronary arteries cannot provide adequate supply. Subsequent interventions include the administration of oxygen, nitrates, and aspirin, alongside rapid diagnostic screening via a 12-lead ECG.

Understanding **Aortic Stenosis** is another technical requirement. Nurses must recognize the classic triad of symptoms: chest pain, heart failure, and syncope. Neurological Assessment and Critical Changes
