The **Trinity College London Graded Examinations in Spoken English (GESE)** represent a globally recognized framework for assessing English language proficiency. - Music
- Recent Personal Experiences

Language Functions for Grade 5

The examiner evaluates the candidate's ability to perform specific **language functions**. Technical proficiency is measured by the execution of the following:

- Talking about the future: Informing the examiner about plans and intentions using 'going to' or the present continuous.
- Expressing preference: Comparing different options and stating a clear choice.
- Describing events in the past: Using the Past Continuous to set the scene or describe ongoing actions in the past.
- Stating reasons: Using connectors like 'because', 'so', and 'as' to justify opinions.
- Quantifying: Using 'much', 'many', 'a lot of', and 'a few' accurately within context.

Technical Analysis of the GESE Grade 6 (B1.2) Examination

GESE Grade 6 serves as a transition toward the B2 level. While still categorized under B1, it demands a higher degree of complexity in both grammar and lexis. The exam duration remains 10 minutes and follows the same two-phase structure, but the expectations for **linguistic range** and **accuracy** are significantly elevated.

Subject Areas for Grade 6

The conversation subject areas for Grade 6 require a more abstract level of thought compared to Grade 5:

- Travel and Tourism
- Fashion
- Health and Fitness
- Learning a Foreign Language
- Shopping
- Money

Advanced Language Functions for Grade 6

The technical requirements for Grade 6 include all Grade 5 functions plus:

- Expressing intentions and hopes: Using 'hope to', 'intend to', or 'expect to'.
- Expressing obligation and necessity: Utilizing modal verbs such as 'must', 'have to', and 'need to'.
- Expressing certainty and uncertainty: Using 'definitely', 'maybe', 'might', and 'I'm not sure if...'
- Present Perfect Tense: Candidates must demonstrate the ability to link the past to the present, particularly with duration (using 'for' and 'since').
- Zero and First Conditionals: Discussing factual implications and probable future outcomes.

Practical Implementation: The Topic Form Documentation

Case Studies and Troubleshooting Common Performance Errors

In this section, we analyze common failure modes observed during GESE assessments and provide technical solutions for remediation.

Case Study 1: The 'Monologue' Failure

Observation: A candidate prepares a 5-minute speech for the Topic Phase and refuses to let the examiner interrupt. When the examiner finally asks a question, the candidate is unable to respond because they have lost their place in their memorized script. **Solution:** Candidates must practice 'active listening'. Preparation should involve practicing with a partner who interrupts with random questions. The technical goal is to treat the examiner as a **conversational partner**, not an audience.

The candidate should have a 'bank' of phrases for each grade requirement. For Grade 6, they should memorize transition phrases like "If I have enough money next year, I will..." to trigger the **First Conditional** naturally.

Case Study 3: Topic Form Technical Error

Observation: The candidate downloads the wrong form or leaves it blank, leading to an unguided Topic Phase where the examiner has to choose the points. **Solution:** Double-check the **SELT provider's portal**. The form must be completed and presented to the examiner at the start of the session. It is the candidate's primary tool for controlling the direction of the exam.

The Mathematical Model of GESE Scoring

Trinity examiners utilize a four-band scale for assessment. The final result is not a simple average but a weighted evaluation of communicative effectiveness.

The scoring components are:

- Communicative Effectiveness: Did the candidate achieve the task? (30% weight)
- Interactive Ability: Did the candidate respond appropriately to the examiner? (30% weight)
- Language Requirements: Did the candidate use the required grammar and lexis? (25% weight)
- Delivery: Was the pronunciation and intonation clear enough to be understood? (15% weight)

Each component is graded from A (Excellent) to D (Fail). To pass (Grade C), a candidate must demonstrate a **threshold proficiency** in all areas, particularly in the language functions specified for that grade. A candidate who

speaks fluently but fails to use the **Past Continuous** in a Grade 5 exam may receive a lower grade because they haven't met the technical syllabus requirements.
