**Technical Analysis:** This is a classic application of **Ramsey Theory** ( $R(3,3)=6$ ).

- Step 1: Model the people as vertices of a graph ( $K_6$ ).
- Step 2: Color the edges (Red for acquaintance, Blue for stranger).
- Step 3: Pick one vertex  $v$ . It has 5 edges connected to it. By the Pigeonhole Principle, at least 3 edges must be the same color (let's say Red).
- Step 4: Examine the 3 vertices connected to  $v$  by Red edges. If any two of these are connected by a Red edge, we have a Red triangle (3 mutual acquaintances). If none are connected by Red edges, they must all be connected by Blue edges, forming a Blue triangle (3 mutual strangers).

This systematic approach, taught by Holton, transforms an abstract social puzzle into a concrete graph-theoretic proof.

## Common Pitfalls and Troubleshooting in Olympiad Prep

Many students encounter a plateau after mastering basic techniques. **A First Step to Mathematical Olympiad**
