1. **Imaging Sensors (CCD):** Charge-Coupled Devices, now used in every smartphone camera, were initially refined for astronomical imaging to capture faint light from distant galaxies.
2. **Global Positioning System (GPS):** To maintain accuracy, GPS satellites must account for General Relativity (time dilation due to velocity and gravity), a concept fundamental to astrophysics.
3. **Medical Imaging:** Techniques used to process radio telescope data (interferometry) have been adapted for

use in MRI and CAT scans.

4. Wireless LAN (Wi-Fi): The technology behind high-speed Wi-Fi was originally developed by Australian astronomers searching for the faint radio pulses of black holes.
