Technical Analysis of Key Species: Ancalagon and the Uruk-hai

Two specific entries in the Bestiary deserve deep technical scrutiny due to their complexity: **Ancalagon the Black** and the **Uruk-hai**.

Ancalagon: The Aerodynamics of Legend

Ultimately, *A Tolkien Bestiary* serves as a bridge between the high-literary world of Tolkien's Oxford scholarship and the modern demand for comprehensive, encyclopedic world-building. It remains a vital tool for anyone seeking to understand the sheer scale of the imagination required to build the Undying Lands and the world of Middle-earth.
