The Complexity of the Verb Phrase

The **Verb Phrase (VP)** is the engine of the English sentence. UGE provides an exhaustive analysis of the VP, focusing on tense, aspect, and mood. The authors make a critical distinction between **Time** (a semantic concept) and **Tense** (a grammatical category).
